Advanced Practice Providers: Nourishing Our Workforce



It continues to be a remarkable journey for the two hundred plus, Advanced Practice Provider (APP) group Nurse Practitioners (NP), Physician Assistants (PA), and Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNA) at Connecticut Children's. I am honored to have our accomplishments shared alongside those of our nursing colleagues. In the Office of Advanced Practice Providers (OAPP), we are full of optimism as we continue to address APP challenges, opportunities, retain APPs and decrease turnover by increasing APP engagement and morale. Our vision is to develop Connecticut Children's as the premier pediatric academic medical center in the country for APPs to work, grow, and develop their career.

Much work has been done to support and accelerate the visibility of NPs, PA's and CRNA's at Connecticut Children's. My colleague Garry Lapidus, PA-C, MPH, and I serve as Co-Directors for the OAPP. We report to James E. Moore, MD, PhD, MBA, President, CCSG, with a secondary report to Sarah Matney, Chief Nursing Officer, Juan Salazar MD, Physician in

Chief, and Christine Finck, MD, Surgeon in Chief. In addition, the APP Co-Directors have representation and a voting seat on the Connecticut Children's Specialty Group (CCSG) Board of Directors and coordinate their efforts closely with Dr. Moore. Our gratitude for their support extends beyond measure.

The greatest highlight for 2024 includes our two year Advanced Practice Provider Strategic plan which aligns with Health Compass 2027. A two day strategic planning session was held in the Fall of 2024 which included input from APPs representing different roles and departments. Several key priorities were identified.

- To enhance the understanding of APP group identity and value within the organization;
- To create a standardized approach to onboarding our new team members transitioning to practice; and
- To provide opportunity for professional growth and development for APPs in the organization.

2024 Updates

Supporting ongoing growth and promotions along our APP Career Ladder: Our competency based career ladder was designed to formally progress a team member to a higher level of job responsibility within his/her current position.

Having an APP career ladder in place communicates that Connecticut Children's is invested in the development and retention of its APP workforce.

- provide APPs with clear competency based advancement targets and goals.
 - address the compensation inequity among APPs in many departments
 - provide a clear path to reward our excellent performers and retain them for their clinical acumen, expertise and loyalty to the CT Children's mission.
 - provide a structure to incentivize our APPs to continue to provide excellent care and growth within the institution.

This included a 30- 90-18 day check in for all new team members. Future initiatives include a standardized orientation checklist and evaluation process to ensure the success of our newest team members.

- **Communication and marketing activities** (Chair: Pam Fanning, PA-C) Activities included production of quarterly APP newsletter entitled "The APP Pulse", updating current and accurate APP web content which includes information about our APP community.
- **Professional development activities** (Chair: Meredith Lake, APRN). 2024 marked our inaugural recognition of APPs who are excelling in work beyond their clinical responsibilities. These areas of recognition include work within academics, research and education.

Celebrations and achievements: We have recognized three outstanding APPs at our fourth APP Annual Excellence Award dinner held at the Pond House this past fall. This event celebrated the 7 nominees and 3 awardees. The three awards recognize select APPs for exemplary demonstration of Connecticut Children's values in their clinical practice and interaction with patients and team members. Representing our executive management team, Dr. Jim Moore and Dr. Christine Finck provided welcome remarks and applauded the event that acknowledged the outstanding achievements of our colleagues. Structural Empowerment

MELISSA DIBBLE LEADS EDUCATIONAL INITIATIVES THROUGHOUT CCSG AMBULATORY CLINICS IN NEW ROLE.

In October 2023, Melissa Dibble MSN, RN, NPD-BC, began a new role within Connecticut Children's Specialty Group (CCSG) as a Clinical Education Specialist. CCSG nursing leadership identified a need for the nursing teams in CCSG to have a dedicated educator.

In this new role, Melissa has taken her expertise in education methodologies and best practices to transform the learning experiences for teams within CCSG. Melissa jumped right in and began building structures and processes to support team members' professional growth, streamline onboarding, champion scientific inquiry, and close gaps in orientation and onboarding.

Throughout 2024, Melissa has led and joined multiple initiatives to build education and development within CCSG. Examples of these initiatives include:

- Leveraging the American Academy of Ambulatory Care Nurses (AAACN) professional standards throughout nursing care areas
- Advocating for nurses to attend AAACN to support their professional growth
- Review and create specialty clinic RN competencies
- Launch an ambulatory nursing journal club
- Support quality improvement projects
- Creation of an ambulatory education dashboard
- Launch of ambulatory simulation codes
- Telephone triage education for nursing
- Support professional governance councils
- Support and mentor MA workgroup
- RN refill education
- Create and disseminate ambulatory newsletter every 2 weeks
- Support nurses through obtaining specialty certifications
- Coordinate traveler onboarding and competencies
- Organize ambulatory nursing care week activities
- Plan unit-based competencies dedicated to ambulatory nurses
- BP education quality improvement project
- Participates in onboarding of all new ambulatory RNs

As a result of this new structure and role for ambulatory RNs, Melissa has evolved nursing practice in these clinics. Her leadership and educational expertise is driving practice forward for ambulatory nurses.

Professional Governance Redesign

In the fall of 2024, after completing a thorough literature review, SOAR analysis and think tank sessions, the Nurse Practice Coordinating Council completed the redesign of the old shared governance structure into the revised Professional Governance Model. During this process, NPCC formally adopted the American Organization for Nurse Leadership definition of Nursing Professional Governance: “A structure empowering professional clinical nurses to contribute collaboratively as decision makers regarding the nursing practice environment” (2024) into the Nursing Professional Governance by-laws.



The Nursing Professional Governance Model is comprised of a Coordinating Council, Central Councils, a Supporting Council, Unit-Based Councils and Location-Based Councils. The Nurse Practice Coordinating Council oversees all of Nursing Professional Governance at Connecticut Children’s and all councils included in the structure. This ensures the entire structure aligns to our nursing goals and strategic priorities, as outlined in our Nursing Strategic Plan.

Aligned to the Nursing Strategic Plan, it is a goal that each Unit-Based and Location-Based Council accomplishes the following each year for their unit / location. We look forward to seeing all the work that comes through our new model!

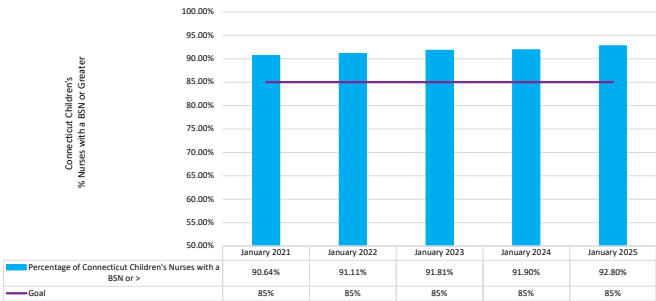

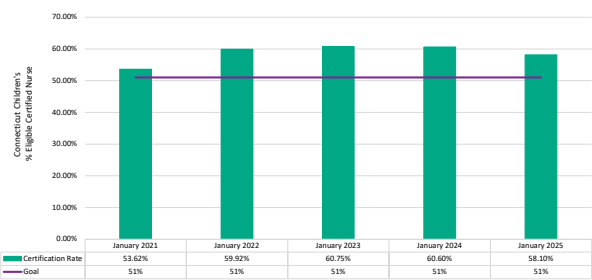

Summary

The Susan D. Flynn Pediatric Oncology Nursing Fellowship program is intended to help stimulate the career interest and foster the professional development of potential Pediatric Oncology Nurses. 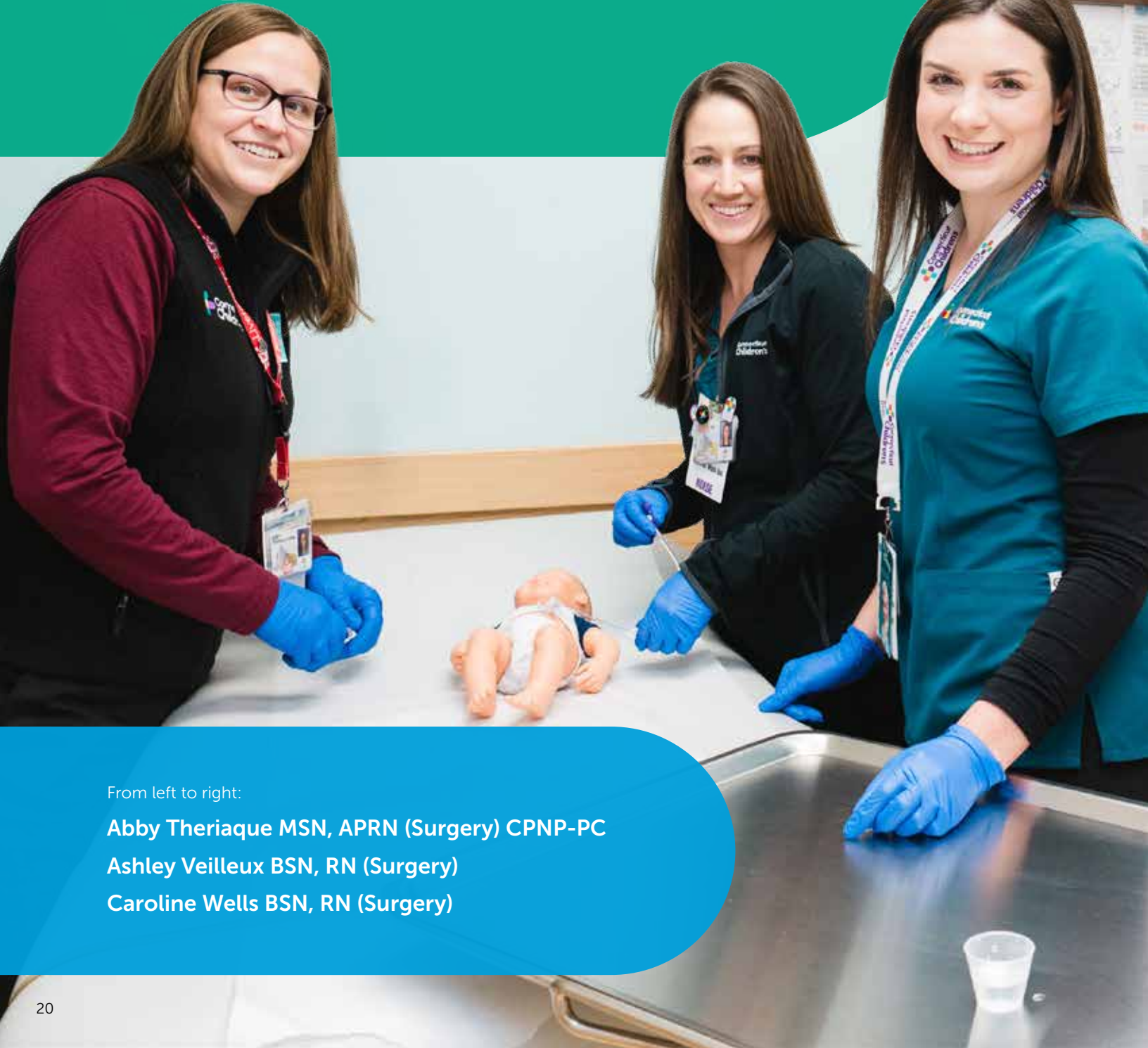

NURSING RESEARCH & EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICE FELLOWSHIP

The Nursing Research and Evidence-Based Practice (EBP) Fellowship is an 18-month program offered by the Institute for Nursing Research and Evidenced-Based Practice (INR). Since its inception in 2015, 31 nurse and 8 interprofessional fellows have graduated from the fellowship program. The program is coordinated by core faculty member Beth Wentland, MBA, BSN, RN along with other core faculty Carrie-Ellen Briere, PhD, RN, and Katherine A. Hinderer, PhD, RN. In addition, partners from the Connecticut Children’s Research Institute and the Clinical Research Nursing Team are invited faculty. Fellows receive didactic content, protocol development support, and project mentoring throughout the course of the program. The purpose of the program is to assist teams of staff nurses, nurse leaders, nurse educators, advanced practice providers (APPs), and clinical services team members to develop a relevant research or evidence-based practice project that will result in achieving best patient or institutional outcomes with the greatest likelihood of success. The fellows are selected through a competitive peer-review process that includes review from the Nursing Research and Evidence-Based Practice Council.

2024-2026 NURSING RESEARCH AND EBP FELLOWS

The 2024/2026 Nursing Research and Evidence Based Practice Fellowship Cohort began on September 25, 2024 and represents the largest cohort to date. 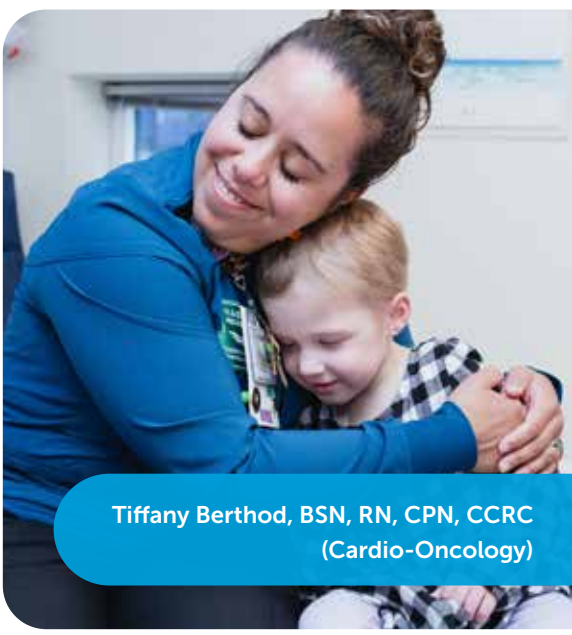

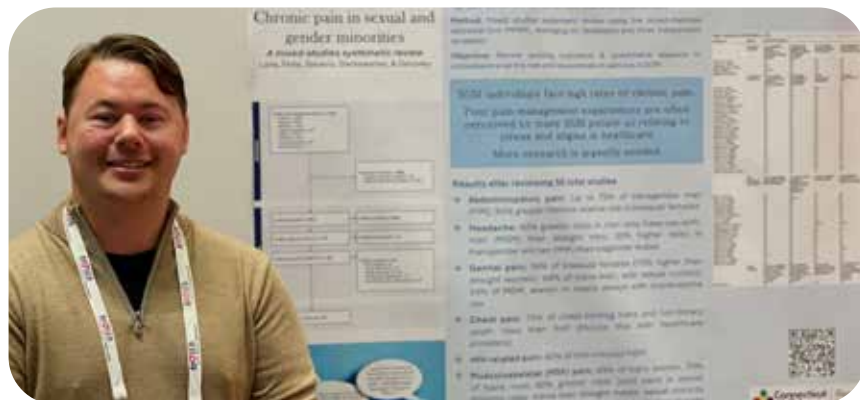
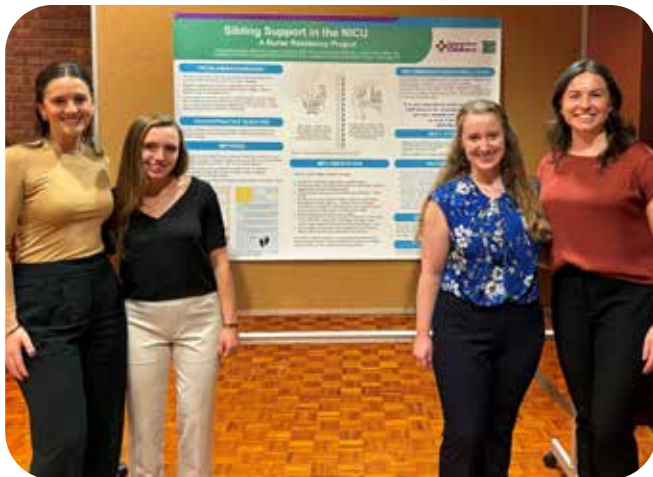

CRN's serve as clinical experts, blending the holistic lens of nursing with research and clinical skills to the pediatric patient and family undergoing clinical trials. Our CRN team is focused on sharing the importance of clinical research in healthcare and how CRNs integrate health with research. The team, led by Clinical Research Nurse Manager Hendriana Nielsen, RD, RN, BSN, CCRP, CPN, includes nurses Eliza Baker, BSN, RN, CNRN, SCRNP and Jaci Donahue, BSN, RN is currently involved in the coordination of many active clinical trials at Connecticut Children's.

Exemplary Professional Practice

MILENA FRAZER BEGINS NEW NEONATAL EDUCATOR AND SIMULATION PROGRAM MANAGER ROLE!

In the fall of 2023 Milena Frazer BSN, RNC-NIC began her new role as neonatal educator and simulation program manager. Throughout 2024, Milena expanded this role to grow our neonatal community outreach initiatives.

During 2024, Milena focused on three primary areas: role of the Neonatal Resuscitation Program (NRP) coordinator, provider simulations, and community outreach education. To elevate the Neonatal Resuscitation Program, Milena slowly began making changes to the NRP program. She brought in actual code carts and patient monitors, and restructured the class to ensure consistency between instructors.

Milena's second focus was on providing realism to the provider simulation classes. She began thinking 'outside the box' using creativity and innovation to make these simulations more realistic. Milena was first tasked with figuring out how to make a realistic neonatal chest for realistic chest tube insertions as the current practice was with a plastic skeleton. She wanted the experience to have the right feel and landmarks. Milena networked with peers and searched for neonatal chests that have the correct landmarks needed for practicing chest tube insertions and needle aspirations. Her search for simulation equipment concluded with nothing. Innovation then struck! Milena found a 3D print formula for creating a neonatal chest through a 3D printer. Milena spoke with experts in 3D printing, purchased the needed materials and came up with a plan. After multiple trials of printing models with different levels of silicone, Milena came up with the perfect model that simulated an actual neonate's chest with correct landmarks! Milena brought this to her provider simulation classes and the feedback was immediately positive and excited. Her 3D printed neonatal chest was spot on to practice inserting chest tubes and needle aspirations.

Milena's third focus in 2024 was increasing neonatal community education through outreach initiatives. Milena obtained a grant that financially covered teaching 60 paramedics NRP as paramedics are currently not NPR-certified. To date, she has completed 2 of the 5 planned classes. Word spread of these classes and Milena has more paramedics interested than spots available. Milena has also been growing neonatal best practice in the community by partnering with community hospitals to teach best practices in neonatal care. She has worked with peer hospitals to help with neonatal preparedness. Her focus is what to do in the time before the NICU transport team arrives. In November 2024, Milena began working on a research proposal for a neonatal cooling project. Her research will include going to community hospitals to teach evidence-based passive cooling techniques and best practices.

Milena's role in neonatal community outreach is helping peers and peer hospitals in growing their neonatal care practices. Her role is instrumental in the care of neonates throughout our state.

Thank you Milena for advocating for our most vulnerable population. We look forward to seeing the continued outcomes from your community outreach programs!

MAGNET CHAMPIONS

In January 2024, we launched our Magnet Champions group. The Magnet Champions group consisted of representation from all nursing areas throughout Connecticut Children's. These Champions learned all components of the Magnet model and brought back information to their teams on how this is seen in our practice.

In February, the Magnet Program Office called with news that the Magnet document passed and Connecticut Children's nursing was going straight to site visit! An exciting day!! This exciting news sped up the work with our Magnet Champions group. The team was excited and ready to bring our appraisers in.

Of course – we had to add in some pediatric fun to our learning – through pirates, princesses & dragons, and Disney themed classes.

MAGNET SITE VISIT

On April 17th, 18th, and 19th, 3 Magnet appraisers representing the Magnet Recognition Program came to Connecticut

THE CALL!!

On June 21, 2024, Sharon Pappas PhD, RN, NEA-BC, Chair of the Commission for the Magnet Recognition Program, called Chief Nursing Officer Sarah Matney MSOL, BSN, CPON, CENP to deliver the final results from the Commission on Magnet vote. Watch parties were gathered throughout the organization and team members gathered in the Family Resource Center to hear the news!

Excitedly, Dr. Pappas announced the Commission's decision to recognize us Connecticut Children's nursing in the 2nd Magnet designation!! Confetti burst through the Family Resource Center and cheers erupted.

The Commission on Magnet awarded Connecticut Children's nursing with seven exemplar of best practice.

1. Professional nursing certification rate: 61.7%
2. Registered nurses with BSN degree or greater: 92.4%
3. 8 quarters of falls with injury data outperforming national mean: 100% of eligible units
4. 8 quarters of HAPI stages 2 and above data outperforming national mean: 100% of eligible units

5. 8 quarters of CAUTI data outperforming national mean: 100% of eligible units
6. 8 quarters of device-related HAPIs outperforming national mean: 100% of eligible units
7. 8 quarters of chemotherapy extravasation rate outperforming national mean: 100% of eligible units

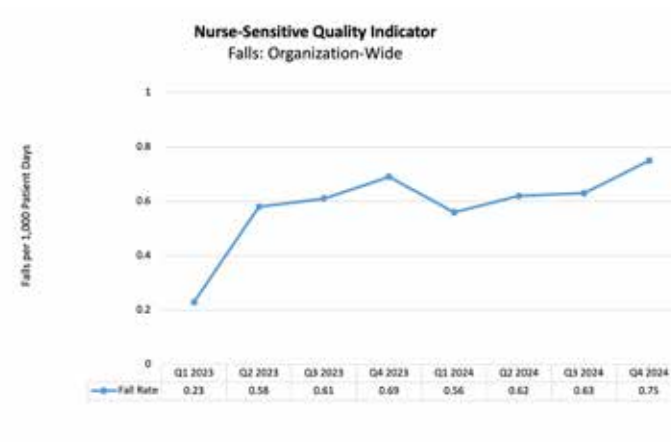
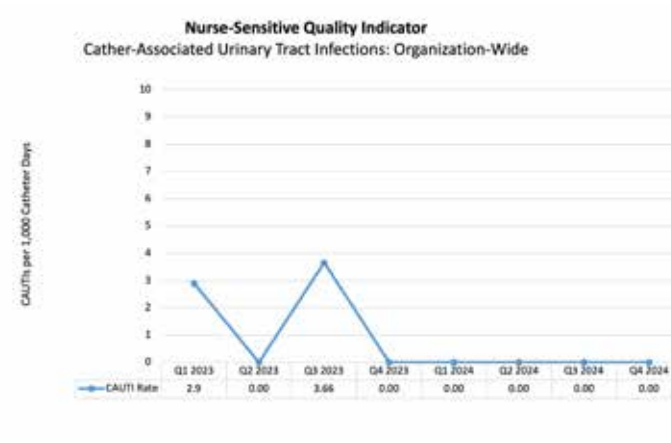
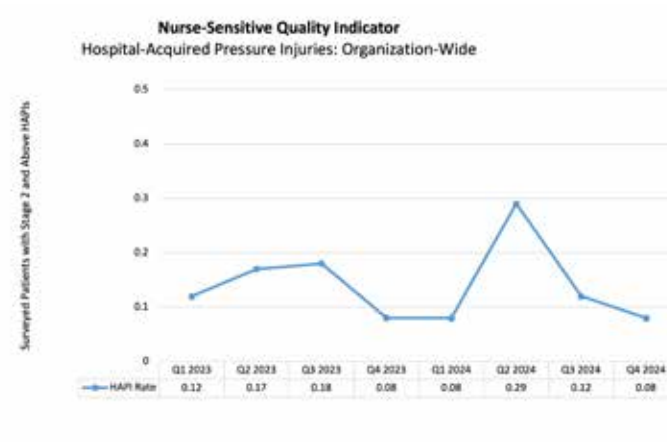
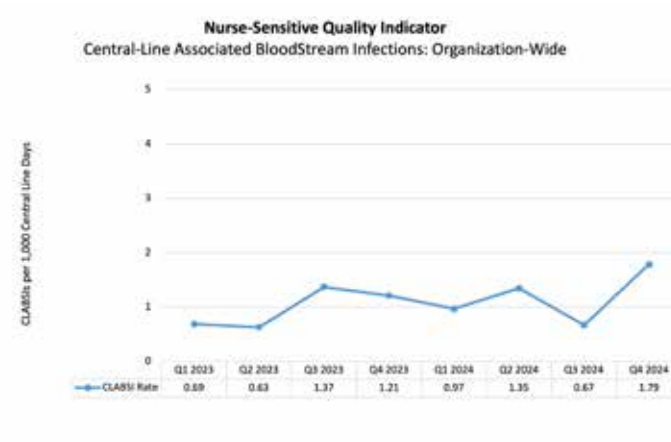
MAGNET CONFERENCE

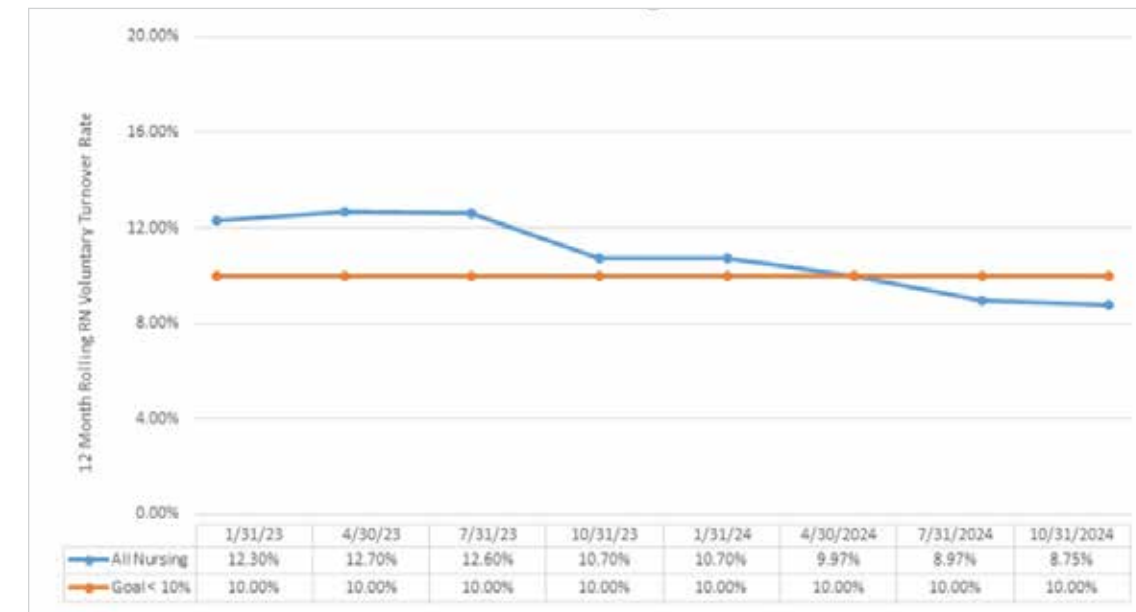

THE EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT NURSING PROFESSIONAL GOVERNANCE COUNCIL LAUNCHES MENTORSHIP PROGRAM!

In the summer of 2024, the professional governance council in the Emergency Department (ED) began discussing how to support new grads in the ED after they complete their orientation. While on orientation, new graduate nurses have 1:1 preceptorship. The preceptor's role is to orient the new grad to the workflow in the ED, grow the new nurse's clinical skills, and build upon their competencies to ultimately function as an independent ED nurse.

After new graduate nurses complete their preceptorship experience, which averages 4 months, they often feel a sense of nervousness when they begin practicing independently. During the professional governance council meetings, new nurses requested having a "go-to" person to serve as a guide. From these discussions, an ED mentorship program was born.

Heather Boudle MSN, RN, CPEN, PED-BC, Team Lead, worked alongside the ED professional governance council, chaired by Hayley Colon BSN, RN and Dorian Kruczek BSN, RN, to create and implement a mentorship program.

After finalizing the structure of the mentorship program, Heather sought out interest within the ED on who wanted to serve as a mentor. Heather received a high volume of responses from nurses, techs, and child life specialists. Instead of pairing new grads with mentors, Heather asked each new grad to submit to her 2-3 choices from the list of mentors. She also inquired what the mentees were looking for from their mentors. Heather then shared this information with the prospective mentors.

In the fall of 2024, the ED mentorship program launched with a mentorship kickoff event! 10 new graduate nurses were paired with their respected mentor. Following, mentors and mentees began meeting weekly to build their mentoring relationship.

The initial feedback from the ED mentorship program shows high satisfaction. Mentees have expressed appreciating having a mentor to check-in with during work and outside of work hours.
