

What are Therapy Services?

Physical Therapy

Helps children develop and improve movement so they can participate in daily activities, play, and school. It supports motor skill development, strength, balance, coordination, flexibility, and posture. Therapists help children learn to move safely, recover from injuries or surgeries, and use assistive equipment when needed. Treatment is play-based and tailored to each child, with guidance provided to families for continued progress at home.

Occupational Therapy

In home care helps children stay safe and independent in their own homes by improving their ability to complete everyday tasks. An OT provides training for self-care activities, evaluates home safety, recommends adaptive equipment, builds strength and coordination, supports cognitive needs, and teaches families how to help.

Speech Therapy

In home care helps children develop communication, speech, language, and feeding skills in the comfort of their own home. A speech-language pathologist works on understanding and using language, producing sounds clearly, early communication, stuttering, and feeding or swallowing challenges. Speech therapy also supports children with autism or developmental delays and includes coaching for parents to use communication strategies during everyday routines.

What Are Nursing Skilled Home Care Visits?

Nursing skilled home care visits are professional, medically necessary services provided by licensed nurses in the patient's home. These visits are designed for children or adults who need clinical care but do not require a hospital stay. Skilled nursing focuses on monitoring health conditions, managing treatments, and supporting recovery while keeping the patient safe and comfortable at home.

What You Should Expect During a Skilled Nursing Visit

① The nurse will perform a Health Assessment which will include:

- Check vital signs (heart rate, oxygen levels, blood pressure, temperature)
- Assess symptoms and overall health
- Review medications and treatments

This helps track the patient's progress and detect early changes.

② The nurse may provide medical treatments and procedures which could include:

- Medication administration (oral or injections)
- Wound care and dressing changes
- Respiratory support (suctioning, trach care, nebulizer treatments)
- Tube feeding support (gastric tube or nasal gastric tube)
- Nasogastric tube replacement
- Catheter or ostomy care

③ The nurse will ensure seamless continuous care by:

- Communicating updates to doctors, therapists, and the care team
- Adjusting care plans based on changes in condition
- Planning next steps in treatment or therapy

④ The nurse will provide family education and support by:

- Teaching caregivers how to use equipment
- Explaining symptoms to watch for
- Providing guidance on managing the child's condition day-to-day
- Offering reassurance and answer questions
